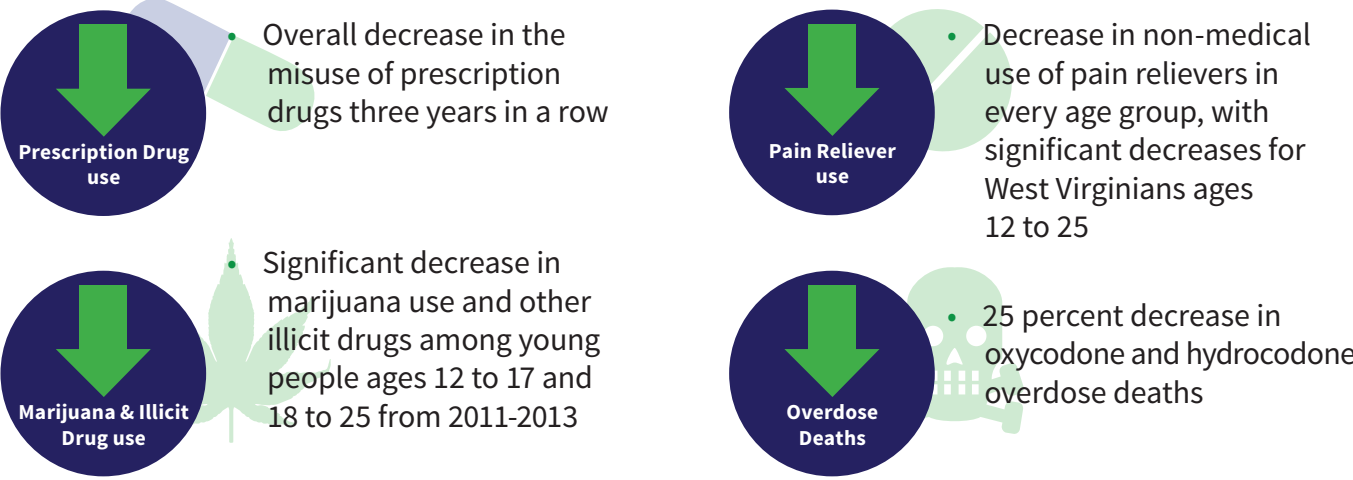

In 2011, Governor Tomblin established the Governor’s Advisory Council on Substance Abuse (GACSA) and charged the council with developing a comprehensive, community-based approach to fight back against substance abuse. Since then, more than 3,800 people have attended 96 public meetings to share thoughts and recommendations, ultimately leading to a number of critical reforms including:

- Establishing a prescription drug monitoring database, reporting requirements and mandatory physician continuing education
- Adopting stricter regulations for opioid treatment center and pain clinics
- Expanding access to Narcan, and other opioid antagonists, to first responders and family members of those struggling with addiction
- Providing access to community-based services to offenders upon re-entering West Virginia communities
- Creating Good Samaritan laws to prevent overdoses by encouraging people to seek timely medical assistance for someone without fear of being prosecuted for certain crimes
- Establishing 1-844-HELP-4-WV – West Virginia’s first 24-hour call center for real-time referral support for those seeking substance abuse services
- Providing funding to expand critical substance abuse treatment services in areas where services were limited in availability or non-existent
- Committing \$4.5 million to expand youth reporting centers statewide to keep children in the home instead of providing services through out-of-home placements

THE RESULTS

Since 2013, nearly \$39 million has been reinvested to enhance community-based treatment and recovery services, nearly doubling programming already available, to provide those struggling with addiction the support they need to get on the path toward recovery and return to their families, communities and workplaces. With the help of Medicaid expansion, West Virginia is making significant progress in reducing the misuse of prescription drugs and the abuse of illegal substances. Research shows:

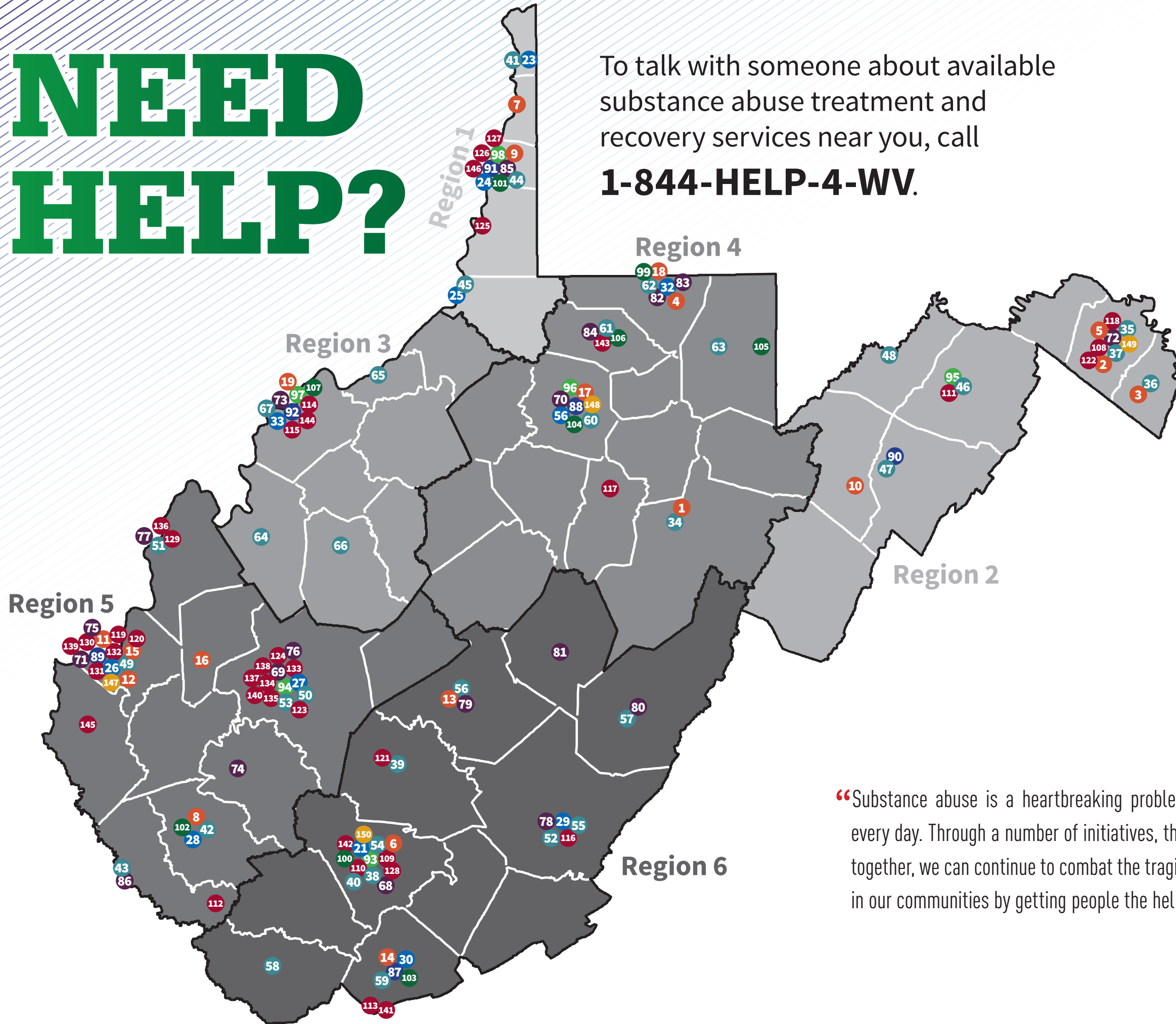
